




In this nested novella, a student becomes intrigued by a mysterious friend whose intimate relationship with the history of the mill town where he grew up informs his politics and enigmatic writing. In Owen Toews' second book *Island Falls*, tender storytelling surrounds an austere allegorical tale embedded in the disastrous story arcs of capitalism and colonialism. With curiosity that often breaches the privacy boundaries of friendship, the narrator's warm and comedic accounts repeatedly shift to a narrative space where the harsh conditions, operations, and confines of the residents of the mill town are explored in clinical detail. Across this split narrative, universal questions emerge about the work of liberation within a fraught and inequitable order. *Island Falls* sketches an inquiry into responsibility and reflection that is also a map repeated infinitely within capitalist geographies and personal histories of occupation, exploitation, and decline.

Contributor Bio

Owen Toews is the award-winning author of *Stolen City: Racial Capitalism and the Making of Winnipeg* (ARP Books). Born and raised in Winnipeg, Owen is a member of the abolitionist prisoner solidarity group Bar None, a member of the Winnipeg anti-austerity coalition Budget For All, and a founding member of the DIY museum collective Winnipeg Arcades Project. He trained as a geographer at the City University of New York Graduate Center. He held the University of Alberta's Grant Nottley Memorial Postdoctoral Fellowship for research in politics, history, economy, or society of Western Canada, and was an instructor at the Macaulay Honors College-Brooklyn College and the Hunter College Department of Urban Affairs and Planning. He works part-time as a university teacher and as acquisitions editor for ARP Books' Semaphore series.



Bloody Sunday (1972) catapulted the Irish "troubles" onto the world stage, exacerbating suspicion in US intelligence circles that the IRA might turn to the Soviets for guns. South Boston native Raymond Daly, just off a CIA stint in Laos, is sent to Ireland to re-establish a line running guns to the IRA. He deftly earns the trust of gunrunner Slowey, a tough money-making South Boston native, who introduces him to an IRA splinter group operating near Blacklion, a town bordering on Northern Ireland.

Ray begins to manipulate Aoife, an Irish woman, in order to gain the trust of the community and embed himself in the organization. After the British Special Air Services raid a safehouse, Ray finds himself involved in executing an informant and his wife. But he also finds himself getting soft on some of those he was sent to infiltrate and becoming more like his cover, "an Irish American gunrunner with a romantic attachment to the Cause," and less like an obedient CIA operative.

Events spiral, culminating in a shootout with the British army that compels Ray to make a Faustian decision on his future and that of Aoife and the others he was assigned to manipulate.

Inspired by complex, real-life political events with far-reaching consequences, Luke Beirne plays with and destabilizes the traditional spy tale. He also ponders the diabolic power invested in intelligence operatives.

Contributor Bio

Luke Francis Beirne was born in Ireland and grew up in Western Canada. His first novel *Foxhunt*, a Foreword Indies 2022 Best Fiction prize finalist, was compared to an early Le Carré thriller. Ghostwriter of more than a dozen genre novels, he has contributed to many publications such as *Honest Ulsterman*, *Hamilton Arts & Letters*, and *Strange Horizons*, including the award-winning story "Models." Luke holds a Master's in Cultural Studies and Critical Theory from McMaster University. *Blacklion* is his second novel. He lives in Saint John, New Brunswick.



The Calf with Two Heads

Transatlantic Natural History in the Canadas

These beautifully illustrated stories of natural history in nineteenth-century Canada are about the curious men and women who crossed the oceans from Europe to explore, map, draw, puzzle about, collect and exhibit nature in Canada. Informed by French, British and Indigenous naturalists, they tried to understand what they saw. What did it all mean about the origins of the world?

Louisa Blair, an amateur naturalist in Quebec and a transatlantic species herself, tells tales on Darwin, Russell Wallace and James Cook, and lingers on the strange and colourful details of Canada's stubborn resistance to evolutionism and its first natural history museums with their penchant for deformities.

These stories feature Indigenous mapmakers, botanical artists, bug-bitten rock fanatics, arctic explorers, and a trio of Quebec women who managed to get plants named after themselves. In short, muddy boots, cold hands, a pocket full of fossils, a mind full of existential questions. To make her case, Louisa Blair has gathered a vast collection of vintage illustrations.

Blair also salutes their successors, the citizen scientists who are now frantically mapping Canada's biodiversity before it fades to bio-monotony. What does it all mean for the end of the world?

Contributor Bio

Louisa Blair is writer, editor and translator who was born in Quebec City, raised in the UK, and returned to live in Quebec 25 years ago. Her books in English include *The Anglos: The Hidden Face of Quebec City* and *Iron Bars and Bookshelves: A History of the Morrin Centre* (Baraka Books). She has also translated numerous books and exhibitions about history, culture and politics in Quebec. Her translation of Robert LePage's play *887* (House of Anansi Press, 2019) was nominated for a Governor General's prize. Her exhibition on natural history in Quebec, entitled *Blossoms, Beetles and Birds*, is on display at the Literary and History Society of Quebec.



The Seven Nations of Canada 1660-1860

Wendake, Odanak, Wôlinak, Pointe-du-Lac, Kahnawake, Kanesatake, and Akwesasne are communities located all along the St. Lawrence River valley and its tributaries. They have been home to descendants of the Huron-Wendat, Algonquin, Nipissing, and Iroquois nations. The one point these First Nations have in common is that their ancestors were allies of the French and had converted to Christianity.

Historians have generally ignored these nations that the French administrators described as "domiciled Indians" ("sauvages domiciliés"). Jean-Pierre Sawaya carefully studied how an alliance of such diverse "missions" was created, developed and conducted to become The Federation of Seven Fires or The Seven Nations of Canada.

How did this confederation come about? Who took part and what were their roles? The answers are mined in the massive colonial archives. *The Seven Nations of Canada* is original research at its best, combining detailed analysis and systematic investigation, that has enabled the author to dispel the tenacious colonial myth about irrational, submissive, and fatalistic Indigenous peoples. Readers will discover forward-looking peoples motivated by a deep desire for independence and solidarity.

Contributor Bio

Jean-Pierre Sawaya holds a PhD in History from Université Laval. He is particularly interested in the political history and diplomatic traditions of the Indigenous peoples of Quebec. He is now working on the history of the RCMP's relations with Indigenous people. He lives in Quebec City. Katherine Hastings has translated or co-translated three novels. She has also translated history books including *Montreal and the Bomb* and *The Plains of Abraham, Battlefield 1759-1760*. Patricia Culliford is an Anishinabe member of the Seven Nations Confederacy. She is a historical researcher whose focus is on the uses of wampum belts in Indigenous/settler relations. She has reached out to Baraka Books to request this translation in order to fulfill a promise made to Chief Mike Thomas. Fred Wiseman PhD teaches Wabanaki decorative arts, ceremonial oratory, dance and song based on historical precedent, but adapted for modern venues and audience. He lives in Vermont.





Told in an engaging graphic novel format, *The Bund* explains the oppressive origins of Jewish resistance in Ukraine, Poland, and the "Pale of Settlement" in Tsarist Russia. Jewish people adapted to industrialization and organized against exploitation. As they became more divided along the linguistic borders of Yiddish and Hebrew, Jewish people split between those who sought a distant ancestral homeland, others who emigrated and adapted to the "new world," and many more who fought against murderous Soviet and Nazi regimes. Charismatic resistance figures including Pati Kremer and Bernard Goldstein kept secular and progressive ideas alive against impossible odds in this graphic account of a little-known story. The first of its kind, this graphic history of Jewish labour resistance lays bare evidence of a radical past that can have massive implications for leftist Jewish struggles today.

Contributor Bio

Sharon Rudahl was born in Virginia and grew up in a suburban Jewish ghetto in Maryland. She worked for anti-war underground newspapers in Madison, Wisconsin, and San Francisco. She was one of the women artists establishing *Wimmen's Comix*, later working for a variety of underground comics, including her solo book *Adventures of Crystal Night*. She lives in Los Angeles.

Michael Kluckner grew up in western Canada and worked for alternative newspapers and as a newspaper cartoonist and commercial artist before commencing a long career writing and illustrating books. His most recent book, *The Rooming House*, is a graphic novel of hippie life in British Columbia and San Francisco. He lives in Vancouver.

Retired former senior lecturer at Brown University, **Paul Buhle** is a sixty-plus year veteran of social movements. He is the publisher of one of the first "alternative" comics in 1969 titled *Radical America Comics*. He has produced a number of non-fiction comics, including *Wobblies! A Graphic History*. He lives in Providence.



Crisis and Contagion is a selection of fourteen interviews conducted by Ian McKay of the Wilson Institute at McMaster University. Interviews with Nancy Fraser, Mike Davis, Mack Penner, Andreas Malm, and Merrill Singer explore capitalism's organic crisis and the ways it has made this and future pandemics inevitable. Nora Loreto, Tithi Bhattacharya, Chandrima Chakraborty, and Sanjay Nepal discuss the experiences of ordinary people in the pandemic. J. Michael Ryan, Laura Spinney, Naomi Klein, and Noam Chomsky explore the long-term effects and likely historical legacy of a pandemic that has changed millions of lives—and, maybe, the trajectory of human civilization.

These scholars propose that to understand the impact of COVID-19, we have to understand the conflictual history of capitalism—and to ward off future pandemics, we need to start building a post-capitalist alternative to the disease-generating and highly unequal global neoliberal order. As capitalist forces work to shove what we have learned from the COVID-19 pandemic down the memory hole, *Crisis and Contagion* offers a must-read for those wanting to seize this moment of change and revolution.



The Mantle of Struggle

A Biography of Black Revolutionary Rosie Douglas

Rosie Douglas, former prime minister of Dominica, had a life unlike any other modern politician. After leaving home to study agriculture in Canada, he became a member of the young Conservatives, under the Canadian prime minister's guidance. However, after he moved to Montreal to study political science his politics started to shift. By the late sixties he was an active civil rights supporter and when Black students in Montreal began to protest racism in 1969, he helped lead the sit-in. He was identified as a protest ring-leader after the peaceful protest turned into a police riot, and served 18 months in prison.

After his deportation from Canada in 1976, having been named a danger to national security, Rosie participated in political movements around the world building global solidarity. He became a leader of the Libyan-based revolutionary group World Mathaba and supported Nelson Mandela's African National Congress. Once back home in Dominica, he led the movement for Dominica's full political independence from Great Britain, then served as a senator in the post-independence government, an MP, party leader, and finally prime minister.


Relying on family sources, interviews, newspaper articles, government documents, and Douglas' own articles, letters, and speeches, Irving Andre has drawn a rich and riveting record of this important Black revolutionary.

Justice Irving André is the author of *A Century of Dominican Cricket*, *Strangers in Suffisant: British West Indians in Curacao*, and the biographies of Franklin Baron, Dominica's first chief minister; Edward Oliver LeBlanc, Dominica's first premier; and Dr. Desmond McIntyre, Dominica's first surgeon. Between 1990 and 2002, André worked as a prosecutor for the Ontario Ministry of Labour, an assistant crown attorney in Brampton, Ontario, a criminal defence lawyer, and a vice-president of the Ontario Licence Appeals Tribunal. In 2002 he was appointed as a judge in the Ontario Court of Justice where he presided as the local administrative judge in the Region of Peel from 2010 to 2012. In 2012, Justice André was appointed to the Superior Court of Justice in Brampton where he currently resides.

Beryl Potter was a reserved working-class mother of three living a decent life, or so it seemed, when a harmless slip and fall marked the unravelling of everything that she had known about herself and the world around her. Over the course of six years, she endured unimaginable pain. As doctors raced to save her life, her limbs and eyesight were taken from her one by one. In the span of a few years, she lost nearly half her body, her financial security, her home, her husband, and any semblance of a recognizable future.

A survivor of more than one hundred surgeries, a dangerous opioid addiction, and multiple suicide attempts, Beryl Potter devoted herself to bettering the lives of other people with disabilities and made a tremendous contribution to disability awareness from the 1970s to 1990s. In this unparalleled biography, Dustin Galer demonstrates how Beryl Potter seemed to crack the code of the social system that oppressed her. By wading into the weeds of her complicated life before and after her accident, Galer leaves readers with a complex portrait of a woman who defied and challenged gender and disability norms of her time, paving the way for disability justice.

Contributor Bio

Dustin Galer is a professional historian with a PhD in history from the University of Toronto. He wrote the first book-length history of the Canadian disability rights movement, titled *Working Towards Equity*, and has published widely on the topic of disability history and labour. He works as a personal historian producing family and corporate history projects and is currently working on his next book about the tragic death of a developmentally disabled man and the complicated quest for justice. He lives in Hamilton, Ontario where he can often be found toiling away in his garden.

Le Guin Prize for Fiction. *Time Magazine* named *The Employees* one of the 100 Must-Read Books of 2022. *My Work*, originally published in Danish as *Mit arbejde*, won the Politiken Literature Prize in 2020. In collaboration with Danish publisher Gyldendal, she edited a selection of Tove Ditlevsen's texts and books that relaunched Ditlevsen's readership worldwide. She has also worked as a critic, teacher, and translator. Ravn lives in Copenhagen.

Jennifer Russell is a translator living in Copenhagen. She received an American-Scandinavian Foundation Award for her co-translation of Rake! Haslund-Gjerrild's *All the Birds in the Sky* in 2020. With Sophia Hersi Smith, she has translated fiction and poetry by Danish writers such as Tove Ditlevsen, Olga Ravn, and Marianne Larsen. 

In this genre-bending debut collection merging horror, fairy tales, pop culture and sci-fi, women challenge the boundaries placed on their bodies while living in a world "among animals," where violence is intertwined with bizarre ecological disruptions.

A sentient sex robot goes against her programming; a grad student living with depression is weighed down by an ever-present albatross; an unhappy wife turns into a spider; a boy with a dark secret is haunted by dolls; a couple bound for a colony on Mars take a road trip through Texas; a girl fights to save her sister from growing a mermaid tail like their absent mother.

Magical yet human, haunted and haunting, these stories act as a surreal documentation of the mistakes in systems of the past that remain very much in the present. Ferrante investigates toxic masculinity and the devastation it enacts upon women and our planet, delving into the universal undercurrent of ecological anxiety in the face of such toxicity, and the personal experience of being a new mother concerned about the future her child will face.

Through these confrontations of the complexity of living in a woman's body, *Her Body Among Animals* moves us from hopelessness to a future of resilience and possibility.

Paola Ferrante is a writer living with depression. Her debut poetry collection, *What to Wear When Surviving a Lion Attack* (2019), was shortlisted for the Gerald Lampert Memorial Prize. 

With dreamlike stories and dark humour, *Anecdotes* is a hybrid collection in four parts examining the pressing realities of sexual violence, abuse, and environmental collapse.

Absurdist flash fictions in "The Boy is Dead" depict characters such as a park that hates hippies, squirrels, and unhappy parents; a woman lamenting a stolen laptop the day the world ends; and birds slamming into glass buildings.

"This Isn't a Conversation" shares one-liners from overheard conversations, found texts, diary entries and random thoughts: many are responses to the absurdity and pain of the current political and environmental climate.

"We're Not Here to Talk About Aliens" gathers autofictions that follow a young protagonist from childhood to early 20s, through the murky undercurrent of potential violence amidst sexual awakening; from first periods to flashers; sticker books to maxi pad art; acid trips to blackouts; creepy professors to close calls.

In "The Dream House," The Past and The Future are personified as various incarnations in relationships to one another (lovers, a parent and child, siblings, friends), all engaged in ongoing conflict.

These varied, immersive works bristle with truth in the face of unprecedented change. They are playful forms for serious times.

Kathryn Mockler is the author of five books of poetry. She co-edited the print anthology *Watch Your Head: Writers and Artists Respond to the Climate Crisis* (2020) and is the publisher of the Watch Your Head website. She runs *Send My Love to Anyone*, a literary newsletter, and is an Assistant Professor at the University of Victoria where she teaches screenwriting and fiction.



A mythic work of sweeping literary imagination, *The Legend of Baraffo* speaks to our current social climate and the ingredients for progress.

In Baraffo, a town gripped by revolutionary fervour, a young boy is grappling with the motivations of an arsonist now imprisoned. Why, Mazzu asks, did Babello burn an empty building? Is the mayor, the chief aide, Giulietta—who the boy adores—the prisoner's supporters, or Babello himself to be believed?

When Mazzu decides for himself, and helps Babello to escape in a mesmerizing spectacle, it ignites in the townspeople a desire for more upheaval, and they push for revolution. Years later, now mayor himself, Mazzu toils to quell the roiling instability that Babello unleashed, failing to do so through politics, but succeeding through art and the enchantment of exalted love.

Within an extraordinary world, this coming-of-age story—of a boy and a town—asks prescient questions about the nature of social change: is it better accelerated by those who seek total transformation, or attained by those trying to work within the system?

Having followed the brilliant virologist Régnier from Montreal to Marseille many years ago, Sadie now works as a researcher in a lab, spending most of her time among microscopic creatures who teach her about life as a parasite. By day, she pushes the limits of her understanding alongside Régnier, who taught her that to study viruses, she must think infectiously, allow herself to be contaminated by dangerous ideas. By night, Sadie loses herself in bars, music, drugs, sensuality. Until she gets a call from the past that lures her back across the Atlantic.

When her estranged father tells her that a bizarre virus has been found in his hospital, Sadie returns to Montreal and her family, and all the unexpected changes time has wrought, to solve this new puzzle. Soon she realizes that the person she thought she was—someone who can leave everything behind—no longer exists. What is left for her instead is sinking into the unknown to find out what happens when ideas come to life.

This is a deeply inventive and singular novel about the power of metamorphosis and symbiosis. Combining the cerebral and the sensual, *Sadie X* explores humanity's relationship to the rest of the world, and the role of rationale—and its limits in our multilayered, regenerative existences.

Clara Dupuis-Morency was born in Quebec City and lives in Montreal. Her first novel, *Mère d'invention*, was a finalist for Prix des libraires du Québec, Prix du CALQ—Work by an Emerging Artist, and for the France-Québec prize, Les Rendez-vous du premier roman. 

The latest poetry and artwork collection from Hana Shafi examines the unlikely connections we make to the people and places we encounter. Despite the infinite variations of our lives, every urban dweller has sparred with a neighbour they disliked, seen beautiful strangers on public transit, told secrets to their hairdresser. We interact with these supporting characters on a daily basis—and often we *are* them for others.

Shafi celebrates the Antiheroes of the world (the alcoholic at your local bar, teenage girls); examines those in Beautiful Leading Roles (the hot professor, the rich couple); lauds older generations of Wizards and Crones; and flags the Nemeses (men who think they're allies, competitors for produce at farmer's markets). We sink into recognition at depictions of Palaces such as the greasy spoon, Dungeons of public transit, and the Liminal Spaces of checkout counters or waiting rooms (including that one at the end of the cosmos).

People You Know, Places You've Been is an insightful, charming collection that offers a sense of shared recognition and nostalgia, ultimately asking: what if seemingly mundane places are actually the foundations of who you are?

Contributor Bio

Hana Shafi is a writer and artist who illustrates under the name Frizz Kid. Both her visual art and writing frequently explore themes such as feminism, body politics, racism, and pop culture. She's published articles in publications such as *The Walrus*, *Hazlitt* and *This Magazine*, and has been featured on *Buzzfeed*, *CBC*, *Flare Magazine*, and *Shameless*. She received the Women Who Inspire Award from the Canadian Council for Muslim Women in 2017. Her first book, *It Begins With The Body* was selected by CBC books as one of the best poetry books of 2018. 



Sparked by a haunting chance encounter with a fox, and told in six chapters of varying form, *Vixen* is as visceral as it is mysterious, sensuous as it is terrifying.

"Thicket" introduces us to stalking being akin to hunting; the similar threat of terror and—too often—a violent end. "Twitchcraft" locates the hunt in the home, the wild in the domestic, while "Season of the Haunt" explores the unrelenting nature of hunting. In *She Who Lies Above*, Beatriz Hausner brings Hypatia of Alexandria, the fourth-century Byzantine mathematician, astronomer, and philosopher, to life. She does so through layered ventriloquism: publishing amorous correspondence from the feminist icon's friend and former student, Synesius the Cyrene, and scribing Hypatia's replies in turn.

These letters are "discovered" by Bettina Ungaro, a librarian and archivist by day, poet by night. She, in turn, collates the correspondence to build a vision of the couple's relationship while writing a kind of postmodern critique of contemporary book and reading culture. These interjections both borrow from and juxtapose writing from ancient times, and, in doing so, explore the evolution of modern knowledge keeping.

The result is a rigorous, hyper-layered collection of poems that are elegiac and erotic; steeped in appreciation for a life of books and the technical and transcendent brilliance their authors can exhibit.

Contributor Bio

Beatriz Hausner was born in Chile and immigrated to Canada with her family when she was a teenager. She has published many poetry books, including *The Wardrobe Mistress* (2004), *Sew Him Up* (2010), *Enter the Raccoon* (2012), and *Beloved Revolutionary Sweetheart* (2020). Her prose and poetry have been published in many chapbooks and included in several anthologies, and her books have been published internationally and translated into several languages, including her native Spanish, French, Dutch, and Greek. 

Caroline is seven when her family flees Pinochet's regime, leaving Chile for Montreal on Christmas Eve, 1986. She fears Santa won't find them on the plane but wakes to find a new Barbie doll, her mother preserving the holiday even amidst persecution and turmoil.

Once in Canada, Caroline accompanies her parents as they clean banks at night; she experiences racist micro aggressions at school, discovers Québécois popular culture, and explores her love of reading and writing in French. Slowly, the Andean peaks disappear from her drawings. As her family increases their wealth and status—moving to a better apartment every six months in Montreal's working-class east-end neighbourhood and then a house in the suburbs—the fracture between her parents' identity and her own grows. When Caroline realizes an apartment she's partying in is one her mother cleans, the division between her parents' life and her own becomes explicitly clear.

This nuanced coming-of-age autobiographical novel probes the plurality of identity, elucidating the interwoven complexities of immigrating to a new country. *As the Andes Disappeared* tenderly reflects the journey of millions and is a beautiful ode to family commitment and the importance of home—however layered that may be.

Caroline Dawson was born in Chile in 1979 and immigrated to Quebec with her family when she was seven. *As the Andes Disappeared*, originally published in French as *Là où je me terre* (2020), was a finalist for various prizes, including the Prix des libraires du Quebec and Radio Canada's Combat national des livres, and won the Prix littéraire des Collégiens and the Prix AIEQ. In the end, his health in decline and with nothing left but memories, he discloses his secret to a confidant.

Amid her institutionalization and pharma-fueled haze, Sara believes this is likely best for her daughter and consoles herself by looking forward to Casey's regular correspondence, which keeps the two connected no matter how far, and how much time goes by.

But, when Sara receives a troubling postcard from her daughter, everything changes and Sara promptly leaves the world she knows to travel to Central America to rescue her daughter from a vague, but imminent danger. 





The KANAVUCCHIRAI quintet develop the context of Sri Lanka's tragic civil war. As the youth in the island village of Nainativu realize that their education and prospects are being curtailed by an increasingly Sinhala majoritarian nationalist government, they begin to rise up in opposition. Volumes 1 and 2, through its main characters, the young woman Rajalakshmi and her betrothed, Suthan, described the growth of the armed struggle from the 1980s onwards as the young people sail to Tamil Nadu in India to join the resistance.

Volumes 3 and 4 return to the micro-environment of Nainativu and the main island of Sri Lanka and the Tamil struggle as it takes shape there. Volume 5 returns to the surviving characters from the first two volumes, and serves more as an afterward that places their story in a global context, as international actors enter the scene. These novels also bring in other characters that speak to the different political and ideological movements at the time: both militant and pacifist, leftist and nationalist. Devakanthan shows how different political movements drew inspiration from each other, and how divisions appeared and grew within what was first seen as an unshakeable organization.


Devakanthan's characters are richly detailed, both male and female protagonists endowed with internal lives. The quintet thoughtfully and sensitively narrates the story of simple men and women trapped within a national struggle. As a whole it describes how a movement united by lofty goals begins to fall apart, as disagreements appear and former allies go their separate ways.

The quintet won the Government of Tamil Nadu Novel of the Year Award (1998) for THIRUPPADAIYAATCHI (*His Sacred Army*), and the Tamil Literary Garden's Best Novel Award (Canada, 2014).

Contributor Bio

Devakanthan (Bala Kumarasamy) was exiled by the war in Sri Lanka in the early 1980s and lived in India before moving to Canada. He lives in Toronto and is an active member of the Canadian Tamil literary scene as author and arts critic. He is a reader of Sanskrit and ancient Tamil, and has drawn from those influences in some of his works, such as *Lankapuram* and *Kathakalam*, being reimaginings of the *Ramayana* and *Mahabharata*. *His Sacred Army*, the first volume of the quintet, won the Government of Tamil Nadu Novel of the Year Award (1998), and the quintet as a whole received the Tamil Literary Garden's Best Novel Award (2014).

Nedra Rodrigo was born in Sri Lanka and came to Canada during the civil war. She is a translator, poet, workshop organizer at the York Centre for Asian Research, and arts educator for youth in the York Region District School Board. She is also the founder of the Tamil Studies Symposium at York University. She is the founder and current host of the bilingual, inclusive literary event, the Tam Fam Lit Jam. Nedra's poetry and essays have been published in various anthologies. She lives in Toronto.





Every person's life story is special and unique. This memoir is about a young immigrant doctor who finds fulfilment by serving Canada's underprivileged peoples. Chandrakant Shah was born in 1936 in a small town called Nandurbar, in the state of Maharashtra, India. He was the ninth of fifteen children in a family of modest means, and recalls his love of studying, which he would often do by the light of a kerosene lamp in the kitchen. (The house had no electricity.) He managed to get to medical school and like many others went to seek better opportunities abroad. He arrived in Vancouver in 1965 and started practicing there, while facing the usual obstacles of racism. But he had observed the plight of the poor and the minorities, and was deeply affected.

"I have never believed in being the silent majority or a bystander who waits for someone to initiate that change," he says.


Having moved to Toronto in 1975, he became involved with the Sioux Lookout Zone Program in Northwestern Ontario by volunteering his pediatric services. He did this for a week or two from 1975 to 1980 and then more frequently until 1988. Visiting remote and isolated First Nations communities to provide necessary medical care, for several years, this sparsely populated area became his second home. The size of the communities ranged from 250 to 1,600 people and the health stations were poorly staffed.

He retired in 2001 and was invited to work as a primary care physician at the Anishnawbe Health Toronto (AHT), a community health center. "By then I considered myself well-versed about Indigenous Peoples, but soon realized how little I knew."

Contributor Bio

Dr. Chandrakant P. Shah (born in India in 1936), Professor Emeritus at the Dalla Lana School of Public Health, University of Toronto, is a retired physician, a public health practitioner and an advocate for improving the health and well-being of marginalized groups in Canadian society. He was a Professor in the Department of Public Health Sciences, the University of Toronto from 1972-2001. After retiring from the University, he worked at the Anishnawbe Health Centre Toronto from 2001-2016, where he provided primary health care to the Indigenous community in Toronto; and also researched the urban Indigenous health issues. His research and advocacy work on employment equity had a profound impact on Canadian universities' hiring policy of visible minorities as professors. Dr. Shah has been awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Science by the University of Toronto, and in 2007 the University's Dalla Lana School of Public Health established

the C.P. Shah Alumni Award of Excellence in Public Health. His textbook, *Shah's Public Health and Preventive Health Care in Canada* now in its 6th edition, is a unique resource that is widely used by Canadian undergraduate and graduate students.

In 2021, Obsidian Theatre engaged twenty-one writers to create twenty-one new stories about imagined Black futures. Twenty-one to celebrate Obsidian's twenty-first anniversary in 2021. Each playwright was tasked with scripting a ten-minute monodrama in response to the question "What is the future of Blackness?" To counter the intense early-pandemic isolation and the trauma of witnessing heightened violence toward Black bodies, Obsidian's goal was to give as many opportunities to as many diverse Black artists as possible and to bring new voices together from both theatre and film. It was a grand experiment to create a rich tapestry of possibilities and to uplift Black artists in the process.



A small military-occupied community sits, waiting, parched of natural water while nearby levees hold the rising global shoreline. Seventeen-year-old twins Alix and Evan pass the time in an empty, abandoned pool with what they are able to scavenge from the abandoned houses, while government official Portia returns to familiar places, her past colliding with the present. The planned evacuation notice that eventually reaches all cities has finally come, but the twins learn that survival is not guaranteed. As they rush to reach their grandmother, a retired journalist now living with dementia, her snippets of memories flow like humanity's record player, skipping tracks before the final flood.

A non-linear poetic play that acts like a postcard from the future, *Shorelines* is about family and community in a world ravaged by climate change. It also speaks to the inevitable inequality of disaster response and how poorer communities are disproportionately affected by it. Mishka Lavigne's message within her lyrical piece is urgent and multi-dimensional: it is a reminder that all things are connected and hope can only lie in the relationships we form with the people around us.

**Contributor Bio**

Mishka Lavigne (she/her) is a playwright, screenwriter, and literary translator based in Ottawa/Gatineau. Her plays have been produced and developed in Canada, Switzerland, France, Germany, Australia, Haiti, and the United States. Her play *Havre* was awarded the 2019 Governor General's Literary Award for Drama (French). Her play *Copeaux*, a movement-based poetic creation piece with director Eric Perron, premiered in Ottawa in March 2020 and was also awarded the Governor General's Literary Award for Drama in 2021 as well as the Prix littéraire Jacques-Poirier. *Albumen*, her first play written in English, received the Prix Rideau Award for Outstanding New Creation in 2019 and the QWF Playwriting Prize in 2020. In 2019, a group of scholar-artists led by Jill Carter stood with their audience in a liminal space at the edge of the woods—a space between now and then, a space between now and later. The Collective Encounter is comprised of a courageous group of scholar-artists who came together in July 2019 to create a *survance intervention* that would effect an Indigenous reclamation of territory, placing the settler and Indigenous body, alike, into direct confrontation with a difficult history that has been written over by colonial occupation and invention. This intervention, *Encounters at the "Edge of the Woods,"* opened Hart House Theatre's centenary season in September 2019.

Jill Carter (Anishinaabe/Ashkenazi) works in Tkaron:to with many Indigenous artists to support the development of new works and to disseminate artistic objectives, process, and outcomes through community-driven research projects. Her scholarly research, creative projects, and activism are built upon ongoing relationships with Elders, scholars, youth, artists, and activists positioning her as witness to, participant in, and disseminator of oral histories that speak to the application of Indigenous aesthetic principles and traditional knowledge systems to contemporary performance.



For three years, Evelyne de la Chenelière wrote on the long entrance wall in Montreal's Espace GO as part of an artistic residency that would profoundly shake her outlook on words, theatre practice, and writing. The culmination of this is *Ravage of Life*, a bold departure from prevailing norms where the playwright breaks with written and performative conventions in her dramatization of an endless and multi-faceted instant between life and death.

In this experimental text, bits and pieces of a family's realities unfold in a non-linear simultaneity that reflects with captivating irony the difficulties encountered when language is expected to facilitate communication.

Ravage of Life is a challenging invitation to eviscerate theatre and create a space where thought finds its body, freeing theatrical languages from grammatical constraints, logic, and structure in order to promise new theatrical experiences.



An immersive experience, *Eraser* delves into the memories and fantasies of a classroom of students as they figure out who they want to be. Six students guide readers through their different journeys, taking them along to the cafeteria, change rooms, and playground, to the places where they feel safest and the most brave, vulnerable, and afraid.

Afroze just moved to Canada from Pakistan and is struggling to fit in as a white-skinned gender-questioning convert to Islam. All Jihad wants is to be cool, but he struggles with the appearance of this new student who doesn't look like any of the Muslims he knows. Noah's brother just died, and he's been avoiding processing his grief, which makes him lash out at his best friend, Eli. Eli doesn't know how to support Noah, who he also harbours questioning feelings for. Whitney wants to live by her own rules in her own imaginary world, but she's forced to deal with annoying kids like Tara. Tara loves school and getting straight As, but all the pressure she feels eventually adds up and she crumbles.

Finding a balance between tough realities and honest fantasies, *Eraser* is an energetic and sentimental look at what it's like to navigate differences and connections as a kid.




Starting with the reflecting pool beneath the Unicorn Amphitheatre on Isola Bella, *Poems for a Phantom Lover* pairs a selection of short poems with photographs culled from decades' worth of research into the structure and symbolism of historic gardens, a study that has led Jennifer Dickson to question conventional assumptions about the place of gender identity and sexual role-play in the vivisection of an earthly paradise.

In the collection, sunlight caresses the timeworn fountains, pagodas and loggias populated by gods and idols, while ill winds rasp among the altars and monuments whose stones are steeped in blood. These are gardens of desire, of longing and betrayal, where torment festers under the flagstones and 'the wounds of love / are suppurating stone.'

Contributor Bio

Jennifer Dickson had already established an international reputation as an artist before emigrating to Canada in 1969. Her early work--*The Secret Garden* (1976) and *Three Mirrors to Narcissus* (1979)--challenged assumptions about gender and sexual roles in Western society. During the 1980s and 1990s she travelled extensively in England, France and Italy, focusing on the structure and symbolism of historic gardens. Beauty and its desecration became obsessions, culminating in *The Last Silence--Pavane for a Dying World* (1993-1997), part of the permanent collection of the National Gallery of Canada. In 1976, Dickson was elected a Royal Academician (RA) by the Royal Academy of Arts, in London, England, the only Canadian in the 200-year history of this prestigious institution to have been so honoured. She is, in addition, a Fellow of the Royal Society of Painter-Etchers and Engravers (London, England). She was named to the Order of Canada (CM) in 1995. She lives in Ottawa.



In *Bait & Switch*, Jim Johnstone—poet, editor, and erstwhile physiologist—turns his considerable analytic powers to Canadian poetry.

With characteristic empathy and a researcher's eye, Johnstone explores a variety of topics, including the legacy of science poetry in Canada, the spark that gives rise to the pre-poem moment, and technology and its attendant opportunities for artistic collaboration. He also considers major works by both prominent and up-and-coming Canadian poets, from Christian Bök and Karen Solie to Nyla Matuk and Michael Prior, and takes a deep dive into career retrospectives by Don McKay, Bill Bissett, and Carmine Starnino.

Dan Yashinsky's son Jacob died tragically in a car accident at the age of 26. Dan, Jacob and Jacob's best friend Effie were driving back to Toronto after a magical trip to Montreal when Dan fell asleep at the wheel and crashed. Dan and Effie survived, but Jacob did not. When the unimaginable happens--a parent is still somehow here but their child is gone--all that's left are stories. In the process of grieving his son, Dan realized that he was now Jacob's storykeeper, and *I Am Full* is Jacob's story.

Jacob's death is the least interesting thing about him. How he lived, the kind of man he became, is what matters most. All his life, Jacob had struggled with Prader-Willi Syndrome, but rather than let it defeat him, he became an advocate for people suffering from PWS as well as people coping with various other disabilities. He was a jewelry-maker, a photographer, a songwriter, a TPS crossing guard, and an avid fisherman. Six months after Jacob's death, Dan began to gather and create the texts that make up this chronicle, all the while guided by Jacob's imagined voice. The events in *I Am Full* are drawn from many periods of Jacob's life. Much of it--poems, sayings, speeches, letters, notes--are in Jacob's own words and the rest is told in his imagined voice narrating things that Dan saw him do or hear him talk about. Jacob's voice has been captured and carried in this unique book, which goes beyond the terrible grief of losing a child to preserving and sharing his story.

Dan Yashinsky is a storyteller and writer from Toronto. He is the author of *I Am Full*, *Golden Apples*, *Swimming With Chaucer*, *Suddenly They Heard Footsteps* (winner of the Ann Izard Storytellers' Choice Award), and *Tales for an Unknown City* and the editor of four acclaimed collections of Canadian storytelling: *Ghostwise*, *At the Edge*, *Next Teller*, and *Tales for an Unknown City*. Dan co-founded both the Toronto Storytelling Festival and the Storytellers School of Toronto and began the 1001 Friday Nights of Storytelling in 1978, a weekly open evening of oral stories in Toronto that continues to this day.
